Earl B. Hunt specializes in the study of human and artificial intelligence. Within these fields he has focused on individual differences in intelligence and the implications of these differences for the roles people play within a high-technology society. His book, “Will We Be Smart Enough?”, combines cognitive theory, demographic projections and psychometric research to measure the capabilities of tomorrow’s workforce against the needs of tomorrow’s workplace. Hunt’s more recent book, “Human Intelligence”, presents an evaluation of our knowledge of individual differences in cognition.
