RESEARCH INTERESTS //

Kareen Rozen is a microeconomic theorist studying the foundations of behavioral economics. Her research in this field can be categorized into two main strands: modeling endogenous reference dependence in dynamic settings, and uncovering the testable implications of bounded rationality models. She is also interested in the implications of bounded rationality in market settings. While mainly focused on these aspects of behavioral economics, Rozen's work has also extended to other topics, including bargaining by myopic players and organizational structure in settings without transfers.
