Clarence C. Gravlee is a medical anthropologist whose research focuses on the social and cultural influences on racial inequities in health. He takes a critical bio-cultural approach to health and human development and has interests in cultural dimensions of psychosocial stress, race and human biological variation, ethnicity and racism, culture theory, social network analysis, and research methods. Gravlee currently advises seven doctoral students. He has authored more than two dozen peer-reviewed journal articles and is co-editor of the forthcoming second edition of the Handbook of Methods in Cultural Anthropology. In January 2013, Gravlee begins a four-year term as Editor of Medical Anthropology Quarterly.
